
A Letter From Our CEO

A YEAR OF UPGRADES at Valco Drive

2023 brought some incredible upgrades to JCEO's Valco Drive Outreach Center in Malone, made largely possible thanks to the generous support of the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation (MCHF). With their aid, we were able to enhance the facility and expand our services, to better support the vulnerable communities in our region. These upgrades could not have come sooner, with the expiration of COVID-era benefits in the spring of 2023.

This project encompassed multiple aspects of the location, including the transition of the pantry into a Choice Pantry, the division of the warehouse to include offices for Community Outreach staff, and the revitalization of key facilities such as the bathrooms and kitchen. These enhancements weren't just an improvement on the center's functionality, but on the comfort and privacy for both consumers and staff.



The transformation into a Choice Pantry Model is one we're particularly proud of—this innovative approach empowers consumers by providing them with options over their food selections, giving them control during challenging times and minimizing food waste.


You may remember, we just incorporated the Choice Pantry Model at our pantry on Margaret Street in Plattsburgh in 2022, and it has been hugely successful!

Partnerships

2023 was a year for collaboration, and our partnerships with organizations like Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York, Citizen's Advocates, and Cornell Cooperative Extension grew ever stronger.

Regional Food Bank We are in the process of becoming the designated drop-off point for the Regional Food Bank, where we will facilitate the distribution of goods to surrounding pantries.

Cornell Cooperative Extension With a new horticulturist through CCE, we are improving the quality and quantity of fresh produce grown in our greenhouses. Additionally, we are now able to offer seasonal classes on food cultivation and preparation—keep an eye on our Facebook for the events!

Set to know out Senior Outreach Program

JCEO's Senior Outreach Program stands as a beacon of support and care for the aging population in Clinton County. With a dedicated team of Senior Outreach Program staff, this program addresses the diverse and unique needs of seniors. In 2023, Senior Outreach assisted 1,563 individuals—more than half of whom were over the age of 75.

Program services cover a wide variety of senior needs, from health insurance counseling and medical transportation, to companionship and home repair.



Information, Referrals, and Beyond

One of the cornerstones of the Senior Outreach Program is the provision of comprehensive information and referrals for various programs, benefits, and services that are tailored to the needs of local seniors. Dedicated Senior Outreach staff assist seniors with paperwork and applications for essential services, serving as advocates during challenging times with social security, food stamps, Medicaid, health insurance, and more.

Rural Transportation


Senior Outreach's Rural

This program helps seniors find reliable assistance with items like yard work, housekeeping, personal assistance, and home repairs.

Senior Nutrition Workshop

Launching in 2024, this new workshop aims to empower seniors to make informed and healthy food choices. Sponsored by Hannaford Supermarkets and in collaboration with the Senior Citizens' Council of Clinton County, the Clinton County Health Department, and Cornell Cooperative Extension, this program will teach seniors how to read nutrition labels, gain confidence in cooking healthy meals, and navigate the grocery store with ease.

Head Start and Early Head Start

The Head Start program at JCEO implements the Creative Curriculum, a research based curriculum that encourages hands-on exploration and discovery as a way of learning.

TS Gold observation assessments are used to measure the progress of children across eight domains: approaches to learning, mathematics, creative arts, physical health and development, language development, science, literacy, and social-emotional development.

Individual School Readiness Portfolios are maintained for each child, containing their work samples, developmental notes, and markers of progress towards achieving specific goals, aiding in smooth transitions.

Head Start recognizes that parents are their child's first teacher. Therefore, there are many activities arranged throughout the year to emphasize the importance of the family being involved in their children's education. Parents are actively encouraged to engage in Policy Council and committees, attend parent trainings and workshops, participate in parent trainings and workshops, participate in parent

curriculum activities, attend parent trainings and workshops, join parentteacher conferences, take part in MICE/ Male Involvement initiatives, and contribute to Individualizing Education Plans.

QUALITYstarsNY, New York's voluntary Quality Rating & Improvement System (QRIS) for early childhood programs gave all Clinton and Franklin County Head Start sites a star rating of 4 out of 5 stars.

Throughout the year, Head Start students enjoyed visits from various members of the community, including the fire department, postal workers, PBS staff, and local farmers.


For both counties, total numbers of child outcomes were 48% for three year olds and 52% for four year olds. The data reflects that the level of growth in all learning areas averaged a growth of approximately 39% among four year olds and 31% with three year olds.

The greatest level of mastery for four year olds are in the language and cognitive domains each, with a level of achievement at or above 89%. The greatest level of mastery for three year olds were in the social-emotional, physical, and language

domains, with each having a level of achievement at or above 95%.

These levels of achievement for three and four year olds reflect effective in-person instruction throughout the program. The data also reflects a level of effective instruction using our current programs, The Creative Curriculum 6th edition (Developmentally Appropriate Instruction across curricular areas), the Second Step Early Learning (Social-Education.)
